#### Year 9 Normandy Trip

On Tuesday 30 June 2015, 45 Year 9 students set off to Normandy to visit the sites of the D Day Landings. Despite the strikes at Calais, the group persevered and, after almost 17 hours, arrived at their beachside accommodation near Caen.

Following the gruelling journey, the students enjoyed a relaxing first day visiting the historic Bayeux with its tapestry, market and cathedral in the sweltering heat. Following this the group went bowling, where Sarah Malik emerged victorious. They then spent the evening relaxing and playing on the beach, their own version of mini golf and some sunset yoga.

The third day was a sobering day of History, visiting many WWII sites. Starting with the impressive and moving film at Arromanche's 360 degree cinema, the students visited the American cemetery at Omaha beach and the starkly contrasting German cemetery, La Cambe. They saw where the Germans heavy defences oversaw the landing beaches at Pointe du Hoc, and visited the American Airborne Troops museum at St Mere Eglise, where the film the Longest Day is set.

On the final day, brought a visit to the Pegasus Bridge Memorial, a moving and fitting end to the visit.

The staff on the Normandy trip were incredibly proud of the Highdown students, their patience and cheerfulness in the face of the huge amount of travelling, their interest in the history we were studying and their conduct throughout was exemplary and was commented on by other tourists at sites they visited and teachers from other schools. #### **Sixth Form news**

On Friday 19 of June a small group of sixth form students set out to Oxford to get their first glimpse at life as a student at two of the University's many colleges: St Catherine's College and University College. First, it was off to St Catherine's, where the students were to receive a lecture-style presentation, this was also a chance to hear from the St Catherine's students themselves. With lunch out of the way it was time to head to University College- think Hogwarts, with a few less turrets and much less wizardry. Here, a University college student led the group on a tour of campus. Once again, the students were given a chance to ask questions, learning as much as possible about what it means to be an Oxford student.

The day gave the group much to think about, some of which will be hugely helpful come September, when current year twelves will begin thinking about UCAS applications and university choices.

On Thursday 25 and Friday 26 June 2015, Year 11 students were invited to attend sixth form taster sessions at Highdown for their chosen A-Level subjects. The lessons enabled students to experience the subject briefly and gain an understanding of the subject specification. Afterwards the students were invited to a BBQ which gave them a chance to meet new prospective students and staff. Overall the days were a great success and highly informative for all students involved.

#### **Year 8 French Trip**

This term a group of Year 8 students had the exciting opportunity to experience five days in France. They visited a Canadian War Memorial before travelling into Paris where they saw amazing views of the city from the top of the Eiffel Tower and during a boat ride along the Seine. The students visited a goat farm where they got hands-on experience of milking the goats and making their own bread, followed by a visit to a small village bakery where they learnt the techniques of making traditional pain au chocolat and croissants before sampling the treats. Next they visited a snail farm and most were surprised at how much they enjoyed tasting the different flavours. The last stop was to a chocolate factory learning about the history of chocolate from around the world. All students immersed themselves in the French culture and practised using the language with native speakers.



#### **History Visit**

On Monday 18 May 2015, Year 9 historians were privileged to welcome Edgar Feuchtwanger to Highdown. Edgar is a German born Jew who in the early years of Hitler's rule lived on the same street as him in Munich, and as a young boy experienced the terrible grip of Nazi control over Germany. Edgar spoke to Year 9 about his experiences, and they were all captivated by his story. In 1939 Edgar and his family escaped Germany following Kristallnacht, when Edgar was only 14 years old, and he went on to attend Winchester College, study at Cambridge and become a History lecturer at Southampton University.

Meeting Edgar and hearing his story was an exceptional experience for our staff and students, and the Year 9 students had many questions which he was kind enough to answer. We hope to welcome Edgar back to Highdown again.

#### **Award winning Author**

On 8 July 2015, Sophie McKenzie and the events team from Waterstones, Broad Street, provided Year 7 and 8 students with a most memorable event. Sophie introduced her new book "All My Secrets" and brought it to life with the aid of some reading and role play from four students. #### Curriculum Support Teachers

Christine came to Highdown as an LSA in 2013 to experience life in a secondary school. Having worked at St. Anne's and St. Martin's schools, when the opportunity came up for a job as a primary trained teacher, she applied for the post. This year she has been supporting students who struggle with maths.

Ruth has worked primarily in Year 6 in several Reading primary schools, the last one being Caversham Park. She was encouraged to make the transition to secondary school by Dr. Love, who invited her to help initially in the reptile club as a volunteer.

She was then persuaded to apply for position as Curriculum Support Teacher and has been working with students in English. Our mission is to identify children who would benefit from extra support in and outside the classroom to help them to access the curriculum. Often children struggle during the transition from primary to secondary school and have gaps in their learning which we hope to target, so they build up their self-esteem and confidence. We also focus on children in other KS3 classes who would benefit from small group work and extra support. Next year we are going to be based in the Curriculum Enhancement room where we will be working with individual students as well as group work concentrating on Literacy and Numeracy skills. We hope to work closely with the English and Maths teachers to help differentiate work within and outside the classroom giving children the opportunity to access the secondary school curriculum at their level.

Christine and Ruth are looking forward to working together to ensure that students can improve their literacy and numeracy skills and make the necessary progress to enable them to access the entire curriculum that Highdown has to offer.

#### **Reading Schools Competition**

The U16 team performed fantastically over the three weeks of heats, qualifying 2<sup>nd</sup> for the A team final. At the final itself they performed well against strong opposition, finishing in a very creditable 12<sup>th</sup> place. The U14s qualified 9/25 in the Reading Schools Competition putting them in the B team final after three weeks of heats. At the final everyone ran, jumped and threw exceptionally well, finishing 2<sup>nd</sup> overall, a fantastic achievement.

#### **Reading Schools Town Championships**

The U16 team again pulled out some excellent results and finished 7<sup>th</sup> overall, with a particular mention to Chante Bynoe-Gittens (200m) and Jasmine McCallum (Long Jump) who both won their events.

The U14 team had great success with a number of top three finishes.

Particular mention goes to Grace Hannibal (Shot) and Kyra Hannibal (200m) who both won their events. Overall the team finished 5<sup>th</sup>.

The U13 team had four students finishing 1<sup>st</sup> in their events, Bethan Roberts (75m), Lucy Penton (600m), Naomi Harris (1000m) and Becky Stone (Long Jump). These excellent performances along with the rest of the team meant they finished 2<sup>nd</sup> overall.
