On 20 November 2015, Year 12 Business Studies and Travel and Tourism students were lucky enough to work with a guest speaker, Mrs Rachel Short. Rachel works with Speaker4Schools, a charity which offer speakers to schools regarding a number of different issues. Rachel attended Highdown School and Sixth Form Centre to provide students with a greater insight into Organizational Psychology and Gender Equality in the workplace. Rachel is an experienced business woman, who supports a range of FTSE 250 clients to build individual and organizational capability. She recently attracted wider public attention through appearing on 'Woman's Hour' to talk about the psychology of game-changers, and most recently covered the launch and publication of research into why women succeed at work. CISCO TECHNOLOGY CHALLENGE

Last term a selection of Highdown's finest computer scientists had the opportunity to spend a week's work experience with CISCO. On the first day they were grouped with students from other schools as part of the programs aims of helping to develop the soft skills and teamwork required by industry, then immediately tasked with a dragons den style pitch for the technology solutions they would develop during that week.

In addition to the technology challenge they were introduced the wide range of careers offered by a company like Cisco and given the opportunity to learn from experts in the fields of Engineering, Communications, Cybercrime(hacking), Software Development (Programming), Smart Car technologies... and a talk on the human networking aspects of the role. The emphasis being that addition to being intelligent and creative they would need to be able to interact and work with a wide range of people. While they enjoyed all the sessions those on hacking were the most popular with most of our students.

The feedback from Cisco clearly stated that Highdown students were a credit to their school and were one of the best to have taken part. All participants have been asked to consider a second placement with CISCO once their exams are out of the way, which I think speaks volumes of the impression they have made.

VIROLOGIST VISIT

A virologist from the University of Reading came to visit Highdown on Monday 7 December to deliver a presentation and question and answer session to more able students across the school. The presentation focused on dangerous viruses, such as Ebola. Students were thoroughly engaged in the talk, and came up with some excellent questions. Benjamin Neuman, the virologist, was impressed with the student's knowledge and attitude. The students (and some science staff!) are now more clued-up with viruses, the Ebola vaccine and bats carrying similar viruses in the UK!
