There's a whole series if you like it!</p> <p><i>The White Queen, Philippa Gregory</i> – more great historical fiction</p> <p>International Relations:</p> <p><i>The Sleepwalkers: How Europe Went to War in 1914, Christopher Clark</i> – a definitive book on causes of WWI</p> <p>https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/magazine-26048324</p>	<p>Wars of the Roses:</p> <p>A good place to start and to immerse yourself in the period leading up to Henry VI is to watch the three episodes of <i>The Plantagenets</i> on Dailymotion – the first episode is called ‘the Devil’s Brood’. This covers the 300 years of Plantagenet rule before Henry VI and will cover things you studied in Year 7. It sets the scene for medieval kingship.</p> <p><i>Britain’s Bloody Crown</i>, available on Youtube, is the story of our period up to Henry VII. We watch it during the course, but it is worth a first watch!</p> <p><i>The White Queen</i> series is a highly fictionalised but engaging drama about the period through the eyes of Elizabeth Woodville, a very controversial figure</p> <p>International Relations:</p> <p><i>Britain’s Great War</i> four-part series by Jeremy Paxman, on Vimeo or Dailymotion – he is not an unbiased source!</p>	<p>Revisit your Year 10 work on the rise of Hitler and the different events and contexts which made this possible – the Treaty of Versailles, the 1923 crisis, the Great Depression</p> <p>Revisit your Year 10 work on medicine in WWI – this tells you a lot about the weapons used, the type of warfare and individual battles which you will be studying</p> <p>Revisit Y7 work on medieval kings – watching <i>The Plantagenets</i> in the Watch/Listen section is a good place to start</p> <p>Revisit your Year 9 work on causes of WWI and WWI itself</p> <p>Think about the Armistice100 commemoration – why was WWI so significant, what was</p>	<p>Wars of the Roses</p> <p>Know your kings! We look at several, and confusingly they all share the same three names.</p> <p>Make a clear and memorable front page in your folder of the following six kings</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Henry V • Henry VI • Henry VII • Edward IV • Edward V • Richard III <p>You must –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Have the kings in order, with dates • Show clearly if they were Lancastrian or Yorkist.
