Read through the history of film composition and listen to some of the examples:</p>	<p>The Periods of History: Baroque, Classical and Romantic . By the end of the course (2 years) you should be aiming to play pieces of Grade 6 standard or above. Put together a plan with your teacher to help you get there. If you are self taught, work out how you can improve your instrument skills using online tutorials etc</p>
