You will then be given some summer tasks which will follow on from the induction tasks.

A bit about the course...

Term 1 and some of 2 (September – Half term)

We will start the course by exploring techniques, materials and processes through Skills Workshops. This is a great time for building on skills you already have and learning new ones. It is a time to let go and enjoy materials and loosen up.

We will do the skills workshops within a project theme.

Project theme for skills workshops;

Human Form

Term 2 (December)

In term 2 you will start your personal investigation. This is a project chosen by you – don't worry we have lots of time to discuss what focus you will choose, but do start thinking about what you might like to focus on.

Fine Art ALEVEL

- UNIT 1 = Personal study including essay (plus skills workshops) 60% of overall ALEVEL mark

Year 1-2

- UNIT 2 = EXAM 40% of overall ALEVEL mark

Year 2 - January

You will cover the same assessment objectives as GCSE, yet in more depth, at a pacier rate and with a higher expectation of productivity understanding and quality. But remember you have less subject then GCSE so it balances out – don't worry 😊




Human Form



Foreshortening refers to the technique of depicting an object or human body in a picture so as to produce an illusion of projection or extension in space.

Many Artists including the ones on this slide create interesting works using this technique.




Foreshortening

Foreshortening sketches in pencil...




Task set 1;

Use your phone to take a picture or sit in front of a big mirror, to create a foreshortened pose.

Think about trying to get something to stick out in front so it looks bigger than the rest of you. It is tricky but fun! You can ask someone else to pose for you if you want to.

1. Draw from what you see – in pencil only, time yourself and do a quick 2 minute drawing.
2. Now change position – do another 2 minute sketch in pencil.
3. Now change position – do another 2 minute sketch in pencil.
4. Now create a new position and do a longer sketch – 10 minutes.
5. Now choose one of your previous poses or create a new one and do an extended timed drawing of 30 minutes – this should be a quality tonal drawing in pencil. A4 or A3 size



Task set 1b; *extension*

Use your phone to take a picture or set something up in front of a big mirror, to create a foreshortened **CLOSE UP** pose.

Repeat drawing tasks 1-5 **CLOSE UP**.

1. Draw from what you see – in pencil only, time yourself and do a quick 2 minute drawing.
2. Now change position – do another 2 minute sketch in pencil.
3. Now change position – do another 2 minute sketch in pencil.
4. Now create a new position and do a longer sketch – 10 minutes.
5. Now choose one of your previous poses or create a new one and do an extended timed drawing of 30 minutes – this should be a quality tonal drawing in pencil. A4 or A3 size.





Summer Prep

Task set 2

1. Get an A3 sketchbook.
2. Create a title page for Human Form
3. Create a mind map for Human Form
4. Create a mood board for Human Form
5. Finish drawing tasks and present them on pages after your pages above.
6. Extension – go on to do more human form drawings from interesting angles. In different media if you have any. Simple biro pen can make excellent tonal Artwork.

Tip

Human form drawings can be of the whole figure or you can zoom in on things like hands, feet, backs shoulders, bellies etc.
