What is UCAS?

- UCAS is a central clearing house.
- Responsible for processing applications for all full-time undergraduate studies in the UK.
- The UCAS website has information on all UK Higher Education Institutions and the courses they offer.



Key facts

- Entirely online.
- You can start, continue and track your application via the UCAS Hub.
- Maximum of 5 choices.
- Some course restrictions:
 - Medicine, Veterinary medicine/science, Dentistry (maximum of 4).
 - Oxford **or** Cambridge.



Usually for creative subjects, presented during an interview.


Visit day


